





Key Words



pebbles: small, smooth, round stones found by the edge of the sea.

pier: a structure for people to walk along that is built out into the sea.

cliff: a steep rock face close to the edge of the sea.

harbour: a place by the seaside where boats can stay safely in the water.

bay: a place where the coast bends inwards and sea fills the space.

funfair: a place where there are roundabouts and other rides, stalls and shows.

lighthouse: a tower with a bright light that warns or guides ships at sea.

beach: land by the edge of the sea, usually covered with sand or small stones.

campsite: an place used for camping, filled with tents and caravans.

sand dune: hills or mounds of sand held together by plants, often near the sea.
