We frequently monitor and assess our pupil premium children and put in place an individual approach to addressing any barriers to learning

We also cater for wider emotional needs.

We focus on providing high quality teaching in the classroom, in addition to providing additional targeted support and intervention outside of the classroom.

Pupil Premium children are those pupils who attract government pupil premium funding; those claiming free school meals at any point in the last six years and pupils in care or who have left care through the adoption or another formal route and service children. Brockenhurst CE Primary School 2020-21 allocation of COVID CATCHUP FUNDING - £16,720

At Brockenhurst CE Primary school we will be using a top down model to address the shortfall in pupil progress due to National lockdown. This strategy is based on National measures being kept in place for 2020-21 and the older children in the school not having been brought into school as the chosen National year groups in summer 2020.

We will baseline all children in Autumn 1 and then facilitate 5 afternoons of quality provision through bespoke small group tuition with a fully qualified and experienced teacher. The funding will cover 132 sessions @ £126.24 per session. Although funded through 3 instalments we will be delivering all the intervention within the first 2 terms.

The current Y1/2 were the chosen returning year groups in summer 2020 and have interventions and curriculum in place as per expectations.

Autumn term – Y5 – 2 Afternoons tuition/Y6 – 3 Afternoons tuition

Spring Term – Y3 – 2 Afternoons tuition/Y4 – 2 Afternoons tuition/Y6 – 1 Afternoon tuition
