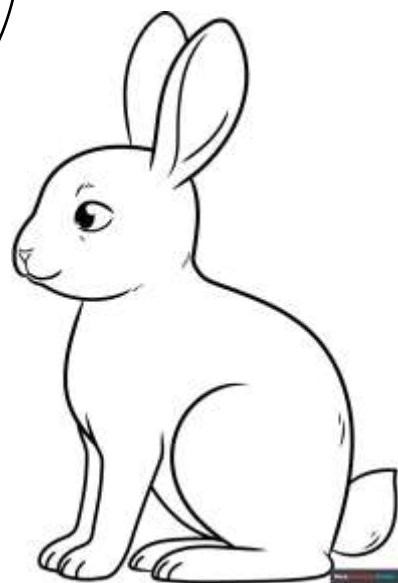

Suggested Reading & Writing Games

Here are some fun, simple games to support learning at home:

Reading Games:

- *Sound Hunt* – find objects around the house with your focus sound
- *Robot Talk* – say words in sounds and blend them together
- *Tricky Word Bingo* – spot and read tricky words
- *Flashcard Speed Read* – how many words can you read in 1 minute?

Writing Games:

- *Rainbow Writing* – write words in different colours
- *Air Writing* – use big arm movements to write sounds
- *Sentence Builder* – build a simple sentence using given words
- *Write & Wipe* – practise on whiteboards or scrap paper

Suggested Maths activities

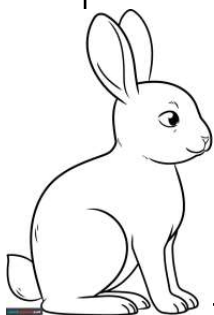
Here are some fun, practical ways to support maths at home:

Place Value to 50:

- *Bundle & Count* – group objects (sticks, straws) into tens and ones
- *Number Hunt* – find numbers up to 50 around the house or outside
- *Build a Number* – use objects to show numbers (e.g. $34 = 3$ tens and 4 ones)
- *Missing Numbers* – practise filling in gaps on a number line to 50

Addition & Subtraction to 20:

- *Use Real Objects* – add and take away toys, snacks, or coins
- *Number Line Jumps* – jump forwards/backwards to solve calculations
- *Dice Games* – roll and add numbers together
- *Shop Game* – practise buying items and giving change



Tips for Supporting Your Child:

Keep practice short (5–10 minutes)

Praise effort, not just accuracy

Encourage your child to say the sounds out loud

Make it fun and playful!
